

Rules and Regulations

- 1. The Delta Agricultural Society shall not be liable for any loss to an exhibitor caused by fire, accident, condition of structure, or the negligence of other exhibitors, officials or otherwise.
- 2. The exhibitor's membership of \$10 must be paid to the Delta Agricultural Society when forwarding entry forms in order for such forms to be processed by the Secretary. There shall be no fee for Junior Homecraft Competition sections but should that Junior Exhibitor wish to enter another section, the entry fee shall be applicable. 3. Any person exhibiting any article or animal not his/her bona fide property, or otherwise violating any of the rules and regulations of the Society, shall be liable to expulsion and forfeiture of premiums. 4. No person shall be allowed to enter for competition more than one article for the same prize, unless the additional entry is a distinct and named variety different
- from the first, except for diploma or a special.

 5. No individual, except the judges and superintendents will be allowed to handle or touch any article exhibited.

 6. No person shall act as a judge or superintendent in a
- 6. No person shall act as a judge or superintendent in a class in which he/she is an exhibitor. Persons so acting shall forfeit all prizes awarded to them in the class.
- 7. All exhibitors must keep their animals in their designated areas at all times. Failure to comply may result in forfeiture of prize money and/or the right to show. 8. Each livestock exhibitor shall respect and abide by the decision of the Fair Veterinarian or the designate as being in the best interest of the parties involved.
- 9. Where there is no competition or if the stock or articles are of inferior quality, the judges may use their discretion and withhold the premium offered. Where there is only one entry, the lone entry may not necessarily win a prize.
- 10. Criticizing or interfering with the judge, show management or other exhibitors while in the show ring or other conduct detrimental to the breed or show may result in disqualification. The decision of the Committee Chairperson shall be final.
- 11. All exhibits in Classes H, I, J, K, M, N, O, P, Q, R, S, and T must be placed in the Main Exhibit Hall / Agricultural Produce Building on Wednesday, July 25th, 2018 between the hours of 4:00 p.m. and 9:00 p.m. The hall will close at 9:00 p.m.
- 12. The above-mentioned classes will be judged in the morning of July 26th. There will be NO entries accepted on this date.
- 13. No hall exhibit shall be removed from the grounds until 5:00 p.m. on July 29th, under penalty of losing premiums.
- 14. All items to be exhibited in Homecraft shall be executed within the last two years and can only be shown for a maximum of two years. Exhibits in Class N must be produced within the last year.

- 15. SPECIAL PRIZES are offered in many sections. They are listed at the end of each class. The specials must be listed on your entry sheet. You will be issued an entry tag for the special along with a regular entry tag. No person may compete for more than one special on the same exhibit.
- 16. ALL SPECIAL PRIZES must be collected within 30 days after voucher is issued. The special is to be received as presented, as merchandise vouchers will NOT be exchanged for cash.
- 17. Specials are subject to change without notice, but they will be replaced with something of equal value.
- 18. Calculation of most points does not require an entry tag. This is a manual operation conducted at the office.
- 19. The Secretary shall retain 15% as membership fees from all Homecraft, Agricultural Produce prize money and 20% from Livestock prize money awarded. Such percentages are only calculated on awards \$10 and over, including specials. Fees for light horses are payable, on the day of the show. All entry fees will be contributed towards prize money and therefore, no HST will be applicable.
- 20. If the receipts are insufficient to meet the prize list in full, the prizes will be prorated as the funds permit. This shall be a decision of the Board.
- 21. All protests must be made in writing to the Secretary on the day of the respective show along with a non-refundable \$25 deposit. The accuser shall furnish proof as requested. The decision of the Committee shall be final.
- 22. Should any discrepancies occur in the awarding of prize money, the matter should be referred to the Secretary before September 15th, 2018. After that, all prizes will be assumed to be correct.
- 23. The Treasurer requests that all cheques be cashed on or before September 30th, 2018.
- 24. A \$20 service charge will be applied to all NSF cheques. 25. EXHIBITOR'S ADMISSIONS. Free admission passes, valid on the day of the show, will be issued to exhibitors as follows:

CATTLE:

- 1 to 4 animals 1 pass, each additional 4 animals 1 pass. GOATS & SHEEP:
- 1 to 8 animals 1 pass, each additional 8 animals 1 pass. HORSES:
- 1 to 2 animals 1 pass, each additional 2 animals 1 pass OTHER DEPARTMENTS: Where fees are \$10 or over, 1 pass will be issued which will be valid July 29th only.
- Exhibitors' passes must be called for at the Office. In no case will passes be malled. Entry tickets will admit the exhibitors with their exhibits upon their arrival at the grounds; but afterwards, such exhibitors must be provided with a regular pass or pay the regular admission fee.
- Please note that passes are not transferable.
- 26. The Delta Agricultural Society will not be held responsible for any printer's errors or other palpable errors in this prize list.



Historical Notes

Established in 1830, Delta Fair is one of Ontario's oldest continuously operating agricultural fairs.



With 39 prominent farmers and businessmen of Leeds County in attendance, the foundational meeting was held at the home of Joseph Derbyshire in Farmersville (now Athens) on June 10th, 1830. The Honourable Charles Jones, a pioneer merchant, miller and Member of the Upper Canada Legislative Council became the first elected President. Jones was born in 1781 and died in Brockville in 1840 after serving the Society as President for ten years.

Three Vice-Presidents were also elected at the inaugural meeting Including George Breakenridge, John Ketchum and Joseph Wiltse. Ben Hamblin became the first Treasurer and J. K. Hartwell of Brockville assumed the role of the first Secretary. Nine community leaders were elected to a Board of Directors including the following citizens: Levi Soper, Edward Howard, Stirling Deming, Elijah Judd, Truman Hicock, George Delong, Jonathon Sexton, R. Munsell and Ebenezer Smith. The membership was comprised of farmers from Elizabethtown Township, Yonge Township, Lansdowne, Leeds Township, Bastard Township, South Crosby Township, Kitley Township and Elmsley Township.

The inaugural fair was held in Farmersville with several farmers from seven neighbouring townships exhibiting their stock and produce. Following a three-year period, the fair was moved to Gananoque which allowed farmers from each section of the County to participate without a great travelling distance being realized. The fair rotated throughout Leeds County for the next twenty-six years until 1856 when it became permanently lodged in Beverley (now Delta).

The existing fair grounds were purchased from William George Morris (farmer and merchant) and his wife Eliza Jane Morris (school teacher) in 1911 for the sum of \$1,600.00. Prior to this date, the grounds which formed a part of the original Thomas Morris farm, were leased from the Morris family.

Originally incorporated as the "South Leeds Agricultural Society", the membership adopted "the people's holiday" as a slogan to represent the fair. In 1930, the Ontario Department of Agriculture erected a stone monument on the grounds bearing a plaque which commemorated the first 100 years' service of the Society to residents of Leeds County. Following this anniversary, the membership opted to change the name to the current Delta Agricultural

Society. In 1980, the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture and Food erected a similar plaque acknowledging the 150 years of service provided by the Delta Agricultural Society.

As the fair grew in size and popularity, the Society purchased additional parcels of land adjacent to the grounds on William Street from Dr. Hans Jacobs in both 1987 and 1993. The additional land allowed for the creation of a parking lot and a horse show ring. While the fair has been held in July, August and September, the fair settled into a new four-day Thursday to Sunday program in July of 2000.





Registration

- Tractors will be weighed in between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 10:00 a.m.
- All participants (drivers and helpers) will be charged daily admission to the grounds. Upon registration, the driver may simply present the gate admission ticket to the Director in Charge who will validate the ticket and then use it as payment of entry fee. Otherwise, registration equal to the daily admission shall be payable.

Rules and Regulations

- 1. All participants will attend a meeting at 9:30 a.m. to review the Rules and Regulations.
- All entries will pull from a manufacturer's standard draw bar hitch. If a ring hitch is used, it must be attached to a standard draw bar and not be higher than 20 inches from the ground or scale pad.
- 3. Only tractors built pre-1965 will be permitted to participate.
- All tractors must have the engine throttle controlled only by the manufacturer's original throttle linkage.
- All tractor operators are to remain seated during the pull and follow the instruction of the track official.
- Any weights or pans falling from tractor while pulling will result in disqualification.
- Competitors must be 16 years of age or with the written consent of parent or guardian.
- 8. All competitors will sign a release.
- 9. Tractors must be weighed after each pull.
- 10. Front end of tractor lifting more than 30 inches will be stopped by the Judge.
- 11. The decision of the Track Judge is FINAL. Debate could result in disqualification.
- Tractors that go out of bounds while pulling are automatically disqualified by the track official.

Notes

- Following unloading, vehicles used in the transportation of tractors are to be parked in the William Street parking lot.
- Consumption of open alcohol by exhibitors/helpers is prohibited.

 Upon registration, the driver may simply present the gate admission ticket to the Director in Charge who will validate the ticket and then use it as payment of one entry fee. Otherwise, registration equal to the daily admission shall be payable.

Rules

- Truck hitch height must not exceed 26" from the ground or scale pad; no ball hitches.
- Competitors must be 16 years of age or with the written consent of parent or guardian.
- All competitors must sign a hold harmless agreement indemnifying the Delta Agricultural Society.
- Trucks must be weighed in after the pull. If the weight exceeds the class or the vehicle is not weighed, the entry is disqualified.

- Stock truck must include the original engine for the vehicle.
- 6. Vehicles must be licenced and insured.
- 7. Trucks with snow plow harnesses, fuel tanks and tool boxes are permitted.
- Only D.O.T. approved tires only can be used.
- Dual wheeled trucks and diesel/chipped are only permitted in the open class.
- 10. Classes will be by weight only.
- 11. No fuel additives, nitrous, etc.
- 12. Seatbelts are mandatory.
- 13. Only the operator may be in the vehicle while pulling; NO passengers.
- Front end of truck lifting more than 30 inches will be stopped by the track official.
- If the competitor does not exceed 75' in his/her first attempt, the competitor may try again and their second pull will be their measured pull.
- Trucks that go out of bounds while pulling are automatically disqualified by the track official.
- 17. Reckless driving before, during or after the pull may lead to disqualification.
- 18. Factory stock suspension only.
- Weights will be no further than inside the rear box.
- 20. Failure to obey the flagman will result in disqualification.
- 21. If there is a protest/complaint against a competing vehicle, the final decision will be made by the fair officials.
- 22. Competitors may opt to enter the next class.
- 23. Evidence of alcohol and / or drugs consumed by the competitor / helper is grounds for disqualification.

- 1. All lawnmowers must be inspected by a member of the Redneck Riders' Organization prior to registration.
- All racers must be wearing running shoes or boots with laces tied up. Open toed shoes are not allowed.
- 3. All racers must be wearing long pants.
- 4. All racers must be wearing a helmet.
- 5. All units must have kill switches.
- 6. All lawnmowers must have working brakes.
- 7. Lawnmowers must be an original lawn cutting mower (no garden tractors) and must be powered by a lawnmower engine.
- 8. Foot or trigger type throttles are allowed.
- All blades, belts and mower decks must be removed.

- 10. All lawnmowers must run on pump fuel; high octane is allowed.
- 11. Mufflers are optional. If they are removed, they have to be routed under the chassis.
- 12. All batteries and fuel tanks must be securely fastened to mower chassis.
- 13. Any modifications made to the engine and/or carburetor must be made with lawnmower parts (with the exception of real axles which are to be a trans-axle or live axle design, chain or belt driven). Front axles may be fabricated or reinforced but have to be mounted in the original location. The front and rear axles may be widened up to 42" outside of the tire. The mower chassis can't be widened, narrowed, lengthened or shortened by any more or less than original manufacturer's dimensional length. Racers can add tubular steel for structural strength. The mower's chassis may be altered only to allow strength of the trans-axle or live axle.
- 14. Snow blower type tires can only be used on the front of the lawnmower.
- 15. Centrifugal clutches and chain driven systems may be used.
- 16. The consumption of alcohol will not be tolerated. If a racer has been drinking to the point that a Member of the Redneck Riders Organization deems the racer impaired, the racer will be disqualified.
- 17. Rough play or horse play will not be permitted in the pit. Only one warning will be issued; a second warning leads to disqualification.
- 18. All lawnmowers must be issued a number.
- 19. Only 3 minutes will be allowed to repair a lawnmower in the event of a break down at the starting line. After the 3-minute time allowance, the race will start without the racer.
- No speeding off of the track; if driving too fast, take an extra lap to slow the mower down.
- 21. Each driver is permitted one helper.
- 22. There will be no refunds.



All livestock must be free of signs of disease or unsoundness for the purpose of showing or competition.

All exhibitors must provide proof of liability insurance not less than \$1,000,000.00 (one million dollars).

The Delta Agricultural Society will not be responsible for the consequences, directly or indirectly, of any animal or exhibitor being disqualified or barred from showing due to contravention of the Code of Ethics.



Code of Ethics For All Livestock Exhibitors

The following practices / procedures are considered unacceptable and defined as cheating in the show ring.

- 1. Misrepresenting the age of the animal for the class in which it is shown.
- 2. Balancing the udder by means other than by leaving naturally produced milk in any or all quarters.
- Treating or massaging any part of the animal's body, particularly the udder, internally or externally with irritant or other substances to temporarily improve conformation or produce unnatural animation.
- 4. Minimizing the effects of cramps or lameness by feeding or injecting drugs.
- Surgery of any kind performed to change the natural contour or appearance of the animal's body, hide or hair; not included is the removal of warts, teats and horns, clipping, dressing of hair and trimming of hooves.
- 6. Insertion of foreign material under the
