REGISTRATION INFORMATION

- ✓ Homecraft and Agricultural Produce exhibits will be accepted for competition on Wednesday, July 23rd, 2025, between the hours of 4:00 p.m. and 9:00 p.m.
- ✓ Exhibitor registration has been relocated from the Fair Office to the Main Exhibit Hall. Registration includes the issuance of an exhibitor's number, entry tags, the submission of the entry form, and receipt of a Sunday gate pass upon payment of membership. Once registered, exhibitors can present their exhibits for competition.
- ✓ Exhibitors cannot use the same number from year to year; a new number will be provided.
- ✓ The adult exhibitor's membership fee is \$10.00 and \$5.00 for junior exhibitors (taxes included).
- ✓ Exhibits must be picked up on Sunday, July 27th between the hours of 4:00 p.m. and 6:00 p.m. Items not picked up by 6:00 p.m. will be held at the Fair Office until July 31st. If you have any concerns regarding the pick-up time, please advise the Homecraft Team when you are dropping off your items on Wednesday.
- ✓ Prize money will now be calculated after the fair. Prize cheques will be available for collection at the Fair Office on Thursday, July 31st between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and noon. Cheques not collected at that time will be forwarded to the exhibitor via Canada Post.

Securely attach the tag to the outside of the bag in the bottom right-hand corner.

No commercial mixes or fillings are to be used.

- All entries must be grown by the Exhibitor.

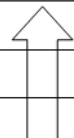
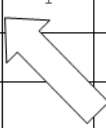
